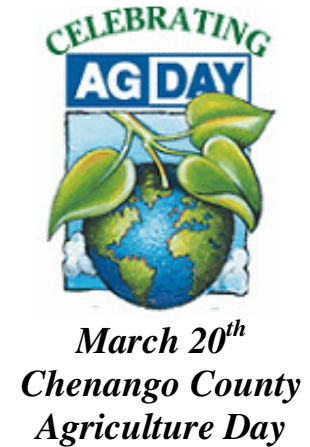


## March 20<sup>th</sup> Proclaimed Chenango County Agricultural Day
